FROM OUR PASTORAL CARE SPECIALIST

The act of prayer is attested in written sources as early as five thousand years ago. Ludwig Feuerbach, a 19th-century German philosopher, summed up the significance of prayer when he stated:

"The most intimate essence of religion is revealed by the most simple religious act: prayer."

All known human religions have some form of prayer and many have complex rituals for prayer both communal and personal. In trying times such as we are living in now, prayer in any of its myriad forms can bring a sense of peace, calm, centeredness, healing and engagement with things greater than ourselves. It can be an antidote to fear, worry, and stress. Therefore, I would encourage everyone to find a form of "prayer" that helps them achieve a more peaceful and centered life.

If you don't already have such a practice, let me share a few.





Known as the "Universal Mantra," "Om Mani Padme Hum" is one of the most recognized Buddhist mantras that focuses on giving and receiving compassion.

From Judaism, the Shema (Deuteronomy 6:5-9): Hear, Israel, the Lord is our God, the Lord is One.

For secular humanists, I can offer this article from *UU World Magazine*: https://www.uuworld.org/articles/humanist-guide-prayer.

Or contemplate this thought: "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is 'thank you,' that would be enough." Meister Eckhart.

To create more tactile prayer, make or buy a set of prayer beads to run through your fingers, buy a mandala coloring book, walk a labyrinth (there are nine in Sarasota alone), do needle work, practice yoga or tai chi.







WORLD ON FIRE: RESISTANCE AND RESILIENCE

It's August and it's hot as hell in Florida. Hurricanes and red tide may appear by the end of the month. Apocalyptic visions aren't popular among UUs. Still, the truth has been revealed in Florida. We can work with others to combine our vision with congregation-based strategies that will be useful during the weeks ahead. It's possible. We've seen it happen during recent days.

World on Fire: Humanitarian Work and Climate Change is an Action of Immediate Witness that was presented at the June national General Assembly for UUs. The statement developed because of UU experiences in Florida. Our statement expresses concern for the very young, the very old, the homeless, undocumented immigrants, those in prisons and other institutions, and other high-risk groups.

Florida's Unitarian Universalists are concerned about what happens before, during, and after community disasters.

Cadillac treatment, some will be abandoned, and some will be abused.

UUs have talked about climate change for more than 20 years but moving from talking to doing has been difficult. The General Assembly was wary when introducing our climate change statement and there was plenty of discussion as our statement developed. We found agreement and the final draft was approved by more than 95% of the delegates who voted. Amazing. A

delegate from Massachusetts joked, "This level of agreement is almost unknown among Unitarian Universalists. In some years, we argue about when to break for lunch."

The religious message from Florida and the Caribbean islands is very simple. The climate change discussion is changing. In the region that's "south of the American South," people are vulnerable and we know that we're vulnerable. Puerto Rico and other islands have been overwhelmed by major storms. Florida people know that their environment is being transformed. The insurance companies and healthcare workers understand this reality and, despite some grumbling, even the climate change deniers are aware of the present situation. People are confused and divided, and a new nastiness is developing in some places.

But it's still possible to bring the themes of diversity, equity, and inclusion into religious work for climate justice.

Congregations can work with other community groups to develop centers of resistance and community disasters.

We know that some people will receive American resilience. African-American people and indigenous people have been Red Cross doing this for five hundred years in Florida and on islands in the Caribbean.

> The lessons are very basic and they're very religious:

Try to live in the right way with the sacred rhythms of nature. Stay together and help each other.


Mutual aid is important but, at a deeper level, what's more important is the spiritual understanding that encourages mutual aid.


"We will be saved together or not at all," said the old-time Universalists.

A few years ago, when we at UUFCC embraced our identity as a lay-led congregation, we were introduced to Soul Matters (SM). Soul Matters is a collection of resources available to UUs which is curated by UU ministers, lay leaders, religious educators, and music professionals. - "Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature."

JOY IN WRITING with Peggydawn Moran


(followed Robert's group) for those who love writing, want to share or just write some more! Autobiography? Fantasy? Sci-Fi? Non-Fiction?

July 10, 2024


IMPROV with Patrick Eaton



GO VEGAN















CARIBBEAN CORNBREAD

An unusual cornbread that is gluten-free, sugar-free, and vegan.

INGREDIENTS

1 cup medium cornmeal
1 cup gluten-free flour
2 TBS baking powder
1 tsp salt
1½ cup coconut milk,
almond milk,
or soy milk
½ mashed banana
¼ cup chopped peppers
or crushed pineapple

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 375° F.
- Grease a nine inch cast iron skillet with vegetable oil.
 A baking pan can be used.
 The skillet or pan should be preheated in the oven.
- 3. Mix all the ingredients together. If the batter is too thick, add more liquid.
- 4. Pour batter into the preheated skillet or pan.
- Bake for about 30 minutes or until the top is browned.
 A toothpick inserted into the center should come out clean.
- Remove cornbread from oven and cool for at least 15 minutes.



Note: Sweet or mild peppers are suggested. If you use Scotch Bonnet or other hot peppers, proceed with caution: a tiny amount mixed with mild peppers will suffice. Nopales (cactus paddles) can be chopped and used with peppers. Canned nopales are available at major markets and specialty shops.


