LETTER FROM THE BOARD

I was first elected to our Board four years ago. Our Fellowship seemed in turmoil. The minister decided to run for public office, making some happy and others not. Other problems and member input led to contract nonrenewal. Added to that a tricky situation with the

spouse of one our most respected members: he was angry about not being allowed to chair a committee. All of this during COVID pandemic complications. Many were upset, some left.

Town meetings and surveys were done. Each Board member called a list of members to discuss various issues.

"Get feedback." "Sort things out." In my calls, one thing surprised me. Two members complained that the Black Lives Matter sign in front of the building disturbed them. I didn't expect that from progressive, liberal UUs. That June I attended the General Assembly in Pittsburgh (overall, a wonderful experience). I befriended an elder Minnesota UU lady with a similar experience: her congregation had many discussions about the wording, preferring "All Lives Matter."

Maybe if I were white, I might be offended by a BLM banner. Maybe if I saw BLM wording as a dot on a blank page, I wouldn't understand in-depth its meaning. Considering how the BLM

movement was started by black moms who lost sons to police violence and seeing our justice system frequently favor police, it is clear to me that justice-minded people must emphasize that black lives matter as it seems they rarely do. In 2016, I attended a UU talk.

When I saw the Black Lives Matter sign, I knew I would be welcomed.

That sign assured this Hispanic woman, as well as the public, that people like me, immigrants from Latin America constantly demonized (particularly by a presidential candidate then running) are welcomed here, that people of color will be respected and have allies here. Then inside, I saw the rainbow flag.

These symbols say who UUs are and what UU is about.

I became a UUFCC member. I formed and currently chair the Immigration Justice Committee. I serve on the Board. I've learned a lot with more to learn.

Being a UU isn't easy.

Our Principles call us to walk in others' shoes, not always easy. They ask us to respect the inherent worth and dignity of all human beings, exercise justice, equity and compassion, search for truth and meaning. Hard work. Most can distinguish right from wrong. But doing what's right isn't always easy or popular.

Yet doing what's right is what gives life to our UU Principles.

During my travels in Michigan last July, I had a chance to visit another UU fellowship.

Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Muskegon is at 1296 Montgomery Avenue, Muskegon, Michigan.

The city of Muskegon is in western Michigan, on the shores of Lake Muskegon, a large inland lake that feeds into Lake Michigan. Muskegon itself was historically an industrial city. It has struggled with loss of population and has tried various efforts at redevelopment.

The Harbor UUs call themselves a "congregation" and their signage advertises them as "a welcoming congregation." They were indeed welcoming.

The service was delivered by a visiting former member.

Two members provided piano and guitar
accompaniment to the singing.

This is a small congregation. Members I spoke with were envious of our UU 100+ members as they list only 40. They occupy a building that had originally been a Congregational church. Their first was destroyed by fire some years ago and they had the opportunity to purchase their current facility.

The building is quite beautiful with a large sanctuary and social hall. Windows were stained glass designs that curiously have no religious iconography whatsoever! Just beautiful stained glass that filtered light throughout! The sanctuary had wooden pews for seating. The handsome brick building sits on a corner of a residential neighborhood so most parking is on the street with a few handicap spaces on one side.

When we discuss the need to grow our membership, I think about this small fellowship and worry for their survival.

Nevertheless, they have a vibrant, dedicated membership, are entirely lay-lead, and all is done via volunteerism.

Their website: harboruu.org professes "many beliefs, one faith."

I enjoyed my visit and will return.







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The China Study was first published in 2005, revised and expanded in 2016, and has been mentioned in prior commUUniqué articles.

The China Study argues for health benefits of a whole food plant-based diet.

It examines the link between eating animal products (including dairy) and chronic illnesses like coronary heart disease, diabetes, breast cancer, prostate cancer, and bowel cancer. It's "loosely based" on the China-Cornell-Oxford Project, a 20-year study that looked at mortality rates from cancer and other chronic diseases from 1973 to 1975 in 65 counties in China, and correlated this data with 1983-84 dietary surveys and blood work from 100 people in each county.

The authors conclude that:

people who eat a predominantly whole-food, vegan diet
—avoiding animal products as a source of nutrition, including
beef, pork, poultry, fish, eggs, cheese, and milk, and reducing
their intake of processed foods and refined carbohydrates—
will escape, reduce, or reverse the development of numerous diseases.

They write that "eating foods that contain any cholesterol above 0 mg is unhealthy." The book recommends sunshine exposure or dietary supplements to maintain adequate levels of vitamin D, and supplements of vitamin B_{12} in case of complete avoidance of animal products.

It criticizes low-carb diets, such as the Atkins diet, which include restrictions on the percentage of calories derived from carbohydrates.

The authors are critical of reductionist approaches to the study of nutrition, whereby certain nutrients are blamed for disease, as opposed to studying patterns of nutrition and the interactions between nutrients.

FORCED LABOR

—often tied to H-2A Agricultural Guest Worker Visa Program—PERSISTS IN U.S. FOOD SUPPLY CHAIN

per Dept. of Labor and recent studies as reported in AXIOS

"Forced labor is indeed involuntary—initial consent to a job doesn't mean it's a legal defense if workers are then subjected to forced labor or any other labor trafficking offense," per Laura Germino, co-founder of CIW (Coalition of Immokalee Workers) a worker-based human rights group.

DEFINITION OF FORCED LABOR is broad and can include both wage and non-wage H2-A violations. Along with underpaying and not reimbursing expenses, violations include jeopardizing housing, transportation, safety, and health. Discrimination and intimidation can also lead to forced labor or labor trafficking criminal cases, says Mike Rios, Executive Director of Fair Food Standards Council:

"Migrant workers are often tied to a single employer (usually a farm labor contractor) on whom they have to rely for nearly everything, from housing and transportation to health care."

FEWER THAN 1% of agricultural employers are investigated annually, but WHD (US Dept. of Labor Wage and Hour Division) finds wage and hour violations in 70% of its investigations, according to the Economic Policy Institute.

SOLUTIONS are in the hands of consumers, retailers and farmers, via programs like the **FAIR FOOD PROGRAM** that have an enforcement mechanism.

IMMIGRANT LABORERS MAKE UP 73% OF THE US AGRICULTURAL WORKFORCE.

H-2A VISA PROGRAM is used by hundreds of thousands of agriculture workers recruited in foreign countries, to navigate a bureaucratic process to gain employment. US Labor Employment and Training Admin. runs the H-2A program, reviews applications, and issues labor certificates. US Citizenship & Immigration Services adjudicates, and US State Dept issues visas.

Farms typically hired a LICENSED FARM LABOR CONTRACTOR, responsible for recruiting, transporting and managing (including housing and paying) farmworkers.

FARM LABOR CONTRACTORS ACCOUNT FOR A QUARTER OF ALL FEDERAL WAGE AND HOUR VIOLATIONS.

WHEN WORKERS ARRIVE, they are instructed on their rights, on how to report abuses, and given a hotline number to call when a violation occurs. Workers come and go as they please but must fulfill contract obligations and arrive at work on time.

WORKERS WHO COMPLAINED were more likely to be fired than their boss receiving punishment.

THE FARM WORKFORCE MODERNIZATION ACT (initially passed by House of Rep. in 2021) provides a pathway for illegal immigrants working on farms to become legal workers.

Co-sponsors and other members of Congress reintroduced it last year. It would also allow farming operations to employ H-2A workers year-round, and let smaller operations share workers and associated housing and transportation costs.

THE FOOD CHAIN WORKERS ALLIANCE, a coalition of worker-based organizations, has criticized the legislation for "tying immigration status to immigration enforcement."

"If this bill became law, several million undocumented farm workers and their families would stop looking over their shoulders," says US Rep. Zoe Lofgren (D-Calif.).

The Midpoint of the Year: September

Originally, September was the seventh month of the Roman calendar, septem is Latin for seven. It was named Vulcan, for the god of fire. Each Roman calendar month was named after a god. (Shades of Dr Spock.) It became the ninth month on the Gregorian calendar and, having thirty days, the month of the harvest, as well as the most common birth month according to the National Center for Health Statistics. Between the years 1994-2014, the most common birth date is September 9th. The least common birth month is February. But February is my birth month and that of my husband and eight other people I know. Two of them, including both my husband and I. have a friend born on the same day. I share with three friends.

There are flowers enough in the summertime.

—from the poem, September, by Mary Howitt, an English poet (1799-1888). She's referring to Asters and Morning Glories. Howitt also wrote *The Spider and the Fly* ("Will you walk into my parlour?"). September begins on the same day of the week as just one other month, December.

"September Song " was composed by Kurt Weill with lyrics by Maxwell Anderson. It was introduced in the 1938 Broadway musical production "Knickerbocker Holiday." My favorite version was that of Frank Sinatra, recorded in 1946. It was a favorite of my Mom's. Trivia (and not so trivial)



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PROMISES by Sharon Whitehill

After Naomi Shihab Nye, "Kindness"

Written and read for Sunday Service for August 25, 2024



Before you can know what promises are, they must be broken on you, your faith in a parent's protection betrayed, your belief in a friend's yow disappeared like first snow on a sidewalk. Remember yourself climbing into the saddle again and again with a Charlie-Brown hope, even bruised and still spitting out grit, seduced by the sweat-salty tang of the horse? Before you can know what promises are you must break them, stare down your shame at what you promised your long-ago little girl: Parents fight sometimes, it's okay, I promise we won't get divorced. Step out of your justifications like a skirt you've dropped on the floor. Like the skin shed by a snake, made tender and raw as the child whose trust you breached with a pledge you had neither the standing nor wisdom to make.

Before you regard any promise as binding, beware of believing that what you are feeling today will endure for the rest of your life.

You must study the thousands who've failed because they fell into despair or addiction, or simply fell out of love.

You must pay heed to women and children in shelters, to victims who clung to their vows to the end.

Before you can grasp what your promise implies, you must understand it as an arrangement. Not only because of the ease of explaining away your own failures—you promised on impulse, you wanted to please, he broke *his* promise first—but understanding that even God barters a this for a that: If you believe, you will enter the kingdom of heaven.

By the time you come to know promises kept as the foundation for living with others, you will have shown who you are in the face of temptation and shipwreck, conflicting motives and moral dilemmas. You will know to tell children the truths they are able to hear, let humility color the hurts both absorbed and imposed, let compassion direct you the rest of the way.










OVEN ROASTED ASPARAGUS


