LETTER FROM THE BOARD

Gossip. I've indulged in it, to my shame, and probably so have you. It's a lot like picking a scab. You know you shouldn't, but it feels soooo good. For a while. Until the real bleeding begins. My friend Roz had a sister, Kate, who moved to our town. After I visited her, I told another friend that although I liked Kate, I thought her house smelled like dog. The "friend" told Roz, who came at me blazing, defending her sister.

And rightly so.

Greater maturity and, later, leading our Happiness class helped cure my judgmentalism. Being on the Board reinforces it hugely. Though its composition has changed in my second term, its commitment has not. Everyone on it serves as a covenantal model to me. That's why I find it mysterious that any person in this congregation would assume any of our leaders has malevolent (or even just selfish) intentions toward anyone else. The worst label I can pin on anyone, including myself, is a kind of benign unawareness of what's rumbling inside each of you. If you doubt that, what possible motive for your leaders' ill-will can you imagine? Power? In a volunteer position? Every one of your leaders and colleagues puts in long hours of dedication. Second-guessing or, worse, distrusting our motives ... well, that hurts.

A current friend told me of a job where she dared not complain to the administrators for fear of reprisal. That's exactly what our covenant exists to prevent. Dissatisfied with someone or something? Feeling personally wounded? Take it, respectfully but directly, to the source. It is never okay to complain about to a third person, no matter how tempting, even to your most trusted friend. It's a tall order, but if people approach you with gossip or complaints? Remind them, kindly and gently, that you're not the appropriate party to talk to about it—that would be triangulation, i.e., a breach of covenant.

Maybe you're tired of these "sound-bites." But though you and I glibly repeat our covenant's words when requested, they're hard words to remember when our emotions come up. They are harder still to abide by. Yet those words, my dear friends, are what make our Fellowship different from all other groups. Even among well -meaning people, conflicts cannot be avoided; it's our covenant that shows us how to deal—not stew in silence, not run away, not gossip, not gripe and complain, but deal—with the conflicts. It's our template for how to be our best

selves, how to feel good inside.

May it be so for us all.

CONCH SHELL TRUMPETS

Be the change that you want to see in the world. That's the message in every season. It's a universal message that's very appropriate for Unitarian Universalists. It's a religious declaration for all people in all places in today's world.

Be the change that you want to see in the world. Some sources attribute the meme to Mohandas Gandhi, and the saying helps to explain his religious wisdom, but some folks mention other sources. The message is easily explained. Demonstrate good behavior. Show people what's possible and what's good. Like Mohandas Gandhi, you can work for political progress, and political progress is needed, but what matters first is something that is very personal and very spiritual.

A few years ago, I was involved in a religious group that wanted to encourage ethical eating. Dietary laws and sermons were suggested, but, after much discussion and listening, our group returned to Mohandas Gandhi's practices. We began to serve vegan and vegetarian food at church events. Community gardening and the use of Fair Trade products were encouraged. Recipes were exchanged. The price of groceries was rising, and some people were worried about protein and taste and food preparation and other matters, and there are all sorts of other challenges, so we did our best to be helpful.

Hurricane Helene arrived in Florida a few days ago. There were mass evacuations in many places and some people lost their homes.

Repairing highways and drainage systems is essential. There's a need, also, to create and sustain a social infrastructure that will serve all of the people in the different neighborhoods. Mutual aid and building voluntary associations will be useful. The moment has arrived.

Show people what's possible and good in a pluralistic society.

On the morning of August 15th, 1947, the Constituent Assembly of New Delhi used a conch shell to announce that the era of colonialism had ended in India. A new era of liberation became possible.

Buddhists and Hindus say that conch shell trumpets (shankhas) provide the sacred OM sound that is important in their rituals. The Om is an invocation of the divine.

For some Unitarian Universalists, the conch shell trumpet has become a ceremonial object used in spiritual practices. Transformation for the good is needed for all nations and Unitarian Universalists are involved. Our congregations join with other groups to encourage a sense of community. Conch shell trumpets announce many possibilities. The Dances of Universal Peace will happen in several places in October. Citizen foresters and community gardeners will gather for harvest dinners. The season of Indigenous Peoples Day (October 12) has special importance. Reconciliation and healing are needed for Florida and the Caribbean.

After Hurricane Helene comes new and notable opportunities to get things right. Music and dance will help.

COALITION OF IMMOKALEE WORKERS (CIW) Congratulates Acclaimed Environmental Activist NNIMMO BASSEY

2024 Wallenberg Medal Winner

The Wallenberg Medal is named after Raoul Wallenberg who saved tens of thousands of Hungarian Jews near the end of World War II.

Notable recipients include Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Miep Gies, John Lewis, Masha Gessen, Elie Wiesel, Denis Mukwege, His Holiness Tenzin Gyatso, Fourteenth Dalai Lama of Tibet, and our own CIW co-founder Lucas Benitez.

Many Wallenberg recipients, including Benitez and Bassey, have worked on the 'frontline' of human rights, forging innovative and lasting solutions to confront the causes of human suffering and indignity.

Nnimmo Bassey is an architect and director of the Nigeria-based ecological think-tank, Health of Mother Earth Foundation (HOMEF), and a member of the steering committee of Oilwatch International, a network resisting the expansion of fossil fuel extraction in the Global South. He chaired Friends of the Earth International (2008-2012), was a co-



recipient of the 2010 Right Livelihood Award (aka "Alternative Nobel Prize"), and received the Rafto Human Rights Prize in 2012.

Sioban Harlow, Professor Emerita of Epidemiology and Global Public Health and chair of the Wallenberg Medal Executive Committee, said of Bassey:

"As an architect, poet, writer and human rights advocate, Nnimmo Bassey works to address

root cause issues driving climate migration, environmental and social impacts of extractive production, and hunger in the Niger Delta. His commitment to socio-ecological justice connects large-scale issues of climate change, exploitation of natural resources, and political/corporate intransigence to the lives of individuals in the Niger Delta and beyond."

Just as we congratulated our own CIW Benitez who forged the FAIR FOOD PROGRAM, we congratulate this year's Wallenberg Medal recipient, NNIMMO BASSEY.

PUNTA GORDA LIBRARY'S MAKERSPACE DEVICES

Provided by Arlene Waters

Want to create! The Punta Gorda Library has equipment that is FREE to use! Set up an appointment, bring your project materials, and be prepared to learn as you go. You'll need to sign a waiver before you begin.

With their Cricut (Cricut Explore Air) machine, you can create with vinyl, cut intricate designs from paper, and do much more! Set up an account on Cricut.com and connect your own device using Bluetooth or USB. You must provide the vinyl, iron-on transfers, and/or paper.

With their 3D Printer (Lulzbot Workhorse), you can design toys, decorations, useful objects and more. Start by creating your design on your own or our device; then, print your project in plastic. You must provide the plastic filament to use in the machine.

With their CNC machine (Nomad 833), you can carve with precision through various materials. The library will provide the machine and design software. You must provide the material to be cut.

With their Laser Cutter (BossLaser LS-1420), you can engrave detailed images and inscriptions into wood or acrylic. Create your design using the library's computer and cut it using their (BossLaser LS-1420. You must provide to materials to be cut.


Also available are (Eversewn Sparrow 30) Sewing Machines. The library will provide the machine, scissors, iron and basic tools. You must provide your fabric, patterns, thread and notions.

OCTOBER: TENTH MONTH OF THE YEAR

Depending on the hemisphere, OCTOBER is associated with either spring or fall. It is also associated with MARS, THE ROMAN GOD OF WAR. The Roman Mars festivals occurred in spring and fall corresponding to both their agricultural



and military seasons. Most interesting? Folk myths, tales and facts.

MYTHS

HERA, according to ancient Greeks, was goddess of women, marriage and



family; protector of women in childbirth; and, wife and sister of ZEUS, king of the gods. Hera is said to have given birth to Mars, without Zeus, when a magic herb was given to her by Flora, Roman goddess of spring.

Mars was the father of Romulus and Remus. They were the twins who founded the city of Rome. Their unwilling mother, Rhea Silvia, was said to have been a vestal virgin at the time of impregnation.



FOLK LORE

If deer have gray coats in October, it will be a hard winter. A warm October means a cold February.

SAMHAIN is a pagan festival marking the end of summer and the beginning of winter. Most notably, October 31st, is the time of the rising of the spirits of the dead . On this night the boundaries between the living and the dead are blurred. Bonfires, dancing and the wearing of costumes are to confuse the spirits.

THE DAY OF THE DEAD, October 31st, is a Mexican holiday when the gates of heaven open at midnight and the spirits of the dead can rejoin their families for 24 hours. Food and other offerings are set out at gravesites or home alters.

Samhain and the Day of the Dead are the forerunners of our cultural celebration, Halloween.



This image first appeared in "The Defender of Ladies" (1451), a French painting based on a manuscript by poet Martin le Franc. The roots are pagan: a fertility rite. Men rode on brooms, pitchforks and poles to encourage the growth of their crops.

FACTS

THE CHICAGO FIRE OF 1871 burned from October 8-10 and destroyed 3.3 miles of the city and 17,000 structures. It left 300 people dead and 100,000 homeless.

OKTOBERFEST was originally held October 17, 1810, in honor of the wedding of Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig and Princess Therese of Saxony. The very successful beer concessions began in 1815 and continue today.

HIBISCUS TEA: COLD & HOT

A popular drink known by several names in the Americas.

Popular cold during hot weather, but it can be served hot.

Hibiscus tea is tart and you may want to add more water or sweetener.

Experiment!

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups dried hibiscus flowers
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 1 piece of ginger, 2-inches or less, peeled and chopped.

½ tsp allspice berries
Stevia or agave syrup as sweetener
Mint or lime wedges

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Add dried hibiscus flowers to 2 quarts of cold water.
- 2. Boil in a medium-sized pot.
- 3. As water boils, add allspice berries, cinnamon, and ginger.
- 4. Turn off heat and steep for about 20 minutes.
- 5. Strain mixture into a bowl and cool to room temperature.
- 6. Sweeten to taste.
- 7. A half-and-half mix of cold tea and plain soda water is possible.
- 8. Serve chilled with ice.
- 9. Mint or lime wedges can be added.

FOOTNOTES

Dried hibiscus flowers are available at major markets and specialty shops.

Stevia or agave syrup are suggested as sweeteners.

Both are native to the Americas.

Allspice is also native to the Americas.
