With love in the center, see more of what we are proud of on page 2!


2. What should we be doing that we aren't already?

FROM OUR PASTORAL CARE SPECIALIST

Bishop Mariann Budde created quite a stir and provoked the ire of President Trump at the end of her sermon at the National Cathedral during the Service of Prayer for the Nation on January 21st. This service tradition began in 1933 and has continued ever since. It Included participation from not only the Christian community, but Jews, Muslims, Buddhists, Sikhs, and a Native American Tribe. In the last few minutes of her sermon, she pleaded with Trump to show mercy to undocumented foreigners and the LGBTQIA+ community, many of whom fear for their lives. She reminded him most of these persons are taxpayers and good neighbors.

She lays out what she calls the "three foundations" of unity — dignity, honesty, and humility.

She summarized the three this way:

"Honor the dignity of every human being. Speak the truth to one another in love. Walk humbly with each other and our God."

You may not find God an important idea, so you may just delete it. I think all persons of good will can subscribe to the rest.

I have spoken to many people recently who are feeling helpless, hopeless, fearful and depressed by the election results and the swearing in of Donald Trump with very good reason. Things are looking somewhat bleak and uncertain. However:

This is the time to gather up our courage, hope, and faith in the basic integrity of our country.

We need to bravely speak our truth and boldly take whatever action we can.

If you need someone to speak with about the current issues or other concerns in your life, just reach out to me and we will talk.

THE MIDDLE OF WINTER

Groundhogs are rare in Florida. However, we had some snow in Tallahassee in January, and snowbirds may have been reminded of Groundhog Day in the North. Governor Ron DeSantis declared an emergency and he put the Florida National Guard on alert. Unitarian Universalists worked with others to manage cold weather shelters for homeless people.

SWIM, the Southeast Winter Institute in Mid-Florida, is an intentional community for Unitarian Universalists.

SWIM people have been meeting each winter for mutual aid since the 1970s. All of the organizers are volunteers. The program includes a combination of worship services, shared dinners, field trips, and singalongs, with some practical information about how to survive and thrive during difficult days. Most leaders are past the age of 65.

The SWIM people have been celebrating Imbolc for about fifty years.

Imbolc is an ancient Celtic holiday that happens at the midway point in winter.

It's an official holiday in the Republic of Ireland. However, it's not necessary to be a Celtic pagan to appreciate Imbolc. The message is easily understood by people in all cultures. Simply stated:

Pause in the middle of winter and look around. Note changes in the natural world. Try to be helpful.

BRIGID OF KILDARE is the powerful female figure identified with Imbolc. Some people say Brigid was a Christian saint and some say she was a Druid in ancient Ireland. It's possible she was both. In any event, she managed a center for resilience and resistance in what is now Kildare. Brigid's sanctuary must have seemed miraculous. It was a place for healing and shelter that fed and protected all sorts of people. Some people said that Brigid was a goddess.

Brigid's symbols include a flaming chalice and candles. In the middle of winter, she provided warmth and enlightenment. Brigid's story is still told in many places. For many individuals, she provides an introduction to a deeper and better understanding of Celtic paganism. During the dark days, please keep Brigid and her message in mind.

It's November in Florida. The days are getting chilly enough for us to run a space heater during the colder nights. My mind returns to a childhood memory, as it does every year as winter creeps in. My memory, always the same, is of me at age five staring out the frost-covered window of our tiny company-house home. We are experiencing a blizzard, and I can't see anything but blowing snow and our ice-crusted street. The live Christmas tree lights are reflecting in the ice-covered window. I am full of anticipation and wonder. I hear them before I see them—


My Santa and reindeer is the giant snowplow driven by union miners, delivering brown paper bags filled with glorious once a year treats.

The contents always include one very large, very juicy Navel orange from a faraway paradise called Florida. The bag also contained some unshelled nuts and a few pieces of chocolate candy.

Following closely on the heels of this 80-year-old's memory, my mind wanders to the people of Asheville, North Carolina, suffering some of the pain I suffered as the child of a coal miner all those years ago. Cold, poor, tired, without resources.

Stores are gone in Asheville. I wanted to help them.

I presented an idea to my UU Fellowship in Port Charlotte, Florida, that as we go through our winter clothes deciding, as we do every year, what to keep, what to pass on:









Let's give our warm jackets, sweaters, gloves, hats, and blankets to the people of Ashville NC where their need is great.

The idea caught on like wildfire in a dry winter forest.

Our UUFCC congregation responded with gusto.

We placed a container in the lobby and donations appeared, first slowly, butthen more than we could have dreamed. My husband and I emptied the container regularly and brought them home.

The time came to make the delivery. We sorted and packed all the amazing offerings in large black plastic bags, labeled them, closed them tight. We asked for help with delivery after meeting with challenges on that front.

A huge shout-out to a Fellowship couple who came to the rescue whose research made a quick delivery happen.

We needed money to pay for delivery.

Conversation Among Friends was ultra-generous, making us able to cover everything.

Carolyn Kellar offered the assistance of her son **Nathan** in Asheville to help with delivery and distribution.

Just like that, I was driving the snowplow.

The event, hosted by the Blanchard House Museum of African American History and Culture of Charlotte County, was well attended by likeminded groups and individuals. What a pleasure to see so many familiar faces. "Lift Every Voice and Sing" was sung by all — very moving. Keynote speaker Jarrett R. Eady gave a very thorough and respectful history of Dr Martin Luther King Jr.

Myrna Charry and Sushila Cherian introduced the student essay contest. This year the winners were 6th to 8th grade girls. The first place winner, Elizabeth Victoria Diana from L.A. Ainger Middle School, read her impressive essay to all. She spoke of Dr. King and his accomplishments. Elizabeth stated that she was originally from the state of Washington where people are more liberal. Elizabeth spoke of LGBTQ+ rights noting that someone being bullied will remember who stood up for them as well as who stood by and did nothing. She said she has always had friends who


were LGBTQ+. A current school friend who is transgender was referred to by a negative term (which I will not repeat); Elizabeth stood up for her friend. Elizabeth also respectfully referred to people from other countries arriving here. Positive words from youth brings hope to all. I gave Elizabeth's teacher my card and a PFLAG flyer.

I noticed the table of police officers, maybe six to seven in all, were all white, no black, no Hispanic. At least there was one woman, **Punta Gorda Police Chief Pamela Smith**. I also gave one of the officers my PFLAG card and our PFLAG flyer. He was very welcoming concerning PFLAG.

We still have work to do, but that morning was a very great day.



Cindy Beal does Justice and Peace Consulting. In a blog dated October 11, 2022, she says:

If we say "inclusion"
but we mean
"We have something that's
perfect exactly the way it is,
so you should come join us
and fit right in,"
that's not inclusion,
that's colonization,

Inclusion is hard work. It isn't just opening the door and saying welcome, but it is being a good host and making your guest more comfortable. In my family of Scandinavian descent, we offer people food and drink when they enter the house. OOPS! We obviously do it for ourselves and it makes us feel less awkward and not because our guests are thirsty or hungry. When we do it, we are inviting someone into our space on our terms. That's more like colonization, isn't it? I only know how to behave based on my values and my experiences.

We say we are welcoming at the Fellowship and we sometimes list the types of folks who are welcome but the thing about lists is they are finite. It is easier to connect with the familiar and our societies are set up like that. We choose who we associate with and that includes our Sunday morning crowds. We reinforce the relationships we already have and make sure to connect with those who are dear. But when we do that, we are not including those who are unfamiliar.


I like that this year the Soul Matters themes are all framed with both Living Love and Practice. Inclusion is hard work and it seems that we need to approach decisions we make with respect and with curiosity. We need to be imaginative and to allow space for others to create the space they need.

Cindy Beal's blog post also has an image with this saying:

"Don't believe everything you think: Learn to replace unintentional harm with intentional thoughtfulness."

If we make decisions with the best of loving intentions and we practice, I think we can get it right.





GO VEGAN













VEGAN GARLIC ALFREDO SAUCE

INGREDIENTS

- 2 pkgs. (10 oz.) frozen onions
- 4 scant TBS minced garlic
- ½ tsp ground black pepper
- 3 cups vegetable broth, divided
- 1½ tsp salt
- 2 TBS lemon juice
- 5 TBS non-fortified nutritional yeast
- 1 heaping cup raw unsalted organic cashews (soaked overnight)

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. On medium, sauté onions, garlic and black pepper for 3 or 4 minutes.
- 2. Add 2 cups of the broth and cook over medium heat for about 8 minutes or until broth has evaporated.
- 3. Put 1/2 cup of broth in bottom of Vitamix (blender).
- 4. Add the cooked mixture to Vitamix.
- 5. Add salt, lemon juice, and nutritional yeast.
- 6. Drain cashews and add to Vitamix.
- 7. Blend on high for a couple of minutes until very creamy and smooth. If needed, add another 1/2 cup of broth.
- 8. Serve over preferred pasta.
- 9. Add any veggies you like perhaps broccoli or even peas.

Store leftovers in the fridge.

The sauce will thicken up even more overnight, which you can thin out a little with a touch of broth when reheating, if necessary.

It even freezes well!




